Human Trafficking: Moody Responds

Innovative Major, New Book and Moody Radio Summit Highlight Moody's Efforts

Several departments at Moody Bible Institute have joined the growing international response to human trafficking, a modern form of slavery and the fastest growing criminal industry in the world. According to the United States' Trafficking Victims

Protection Act of 2000, at least 700,000 persons, primarily women and children, are trafficked internationally each year by force, fraud or coercion. Many of them are trafficked for prostitution, pornography, sex tourism and other forms of commercial sexual exploitation.

"Every semester I have increasingly more students interested in issues surrounding human trafficking," said Pam MacRae, assistant professor of Ministry Studies in the undergraduate school. "Last fall in conversations with Dr. John Koessler, chair and professor of Pastoral Studies in the undergraduate school, we

believe God led us to the idea to create a new major that will specifically train students to serve in the area of this great need." Moody's innovative four-year undergraduate degree, Ministry to Victims of Sexual Exploitation, launches this fall.

This degree will equip students to minister to persons subjected to the global commercial sex trade through biblical training and a thorough examination of societal and cultural factors that contribute to this problem. Students will also come alongside skilled ministry practitioners including Wellspring Living in Atlanta, Ga., through intensive field experience. Founder and director of Wellspring Living, Mary Frances Bowley, is the author of Moody Publishers' upcoming new release, *The White Umbrella: Walking with Survivors of Sex Trafficking.*

"Our prayer is that *The White Umbrella* will do for ministry to victims of sexual

Moody Alumna to Tour with Christian Artist, Matthew West, Fall 2012

It isn't just Lindsay McCaul's soothing alto voice and insightful songs from her debut album that have captured the attention of fans. Each time this singer/songwriter opened as a guest artist on the award-winning Casting Crowns' recent "Come to the Well" tour, people responded to the short video that introduced her to the audience as a graduate of Moody Bible Institute.

abuse and trafficking what *Through Gates of Splendor* did for world missions," said Barnabas Piper, audience development manager in Moody Publishers Acquisitions. "This is an issue everyone can be involved with at some level, and this book uses stories of both survivors and those who ministered to them as well as principles from the ministry of Wellspring Living to show us how we can do that."

Knowing the issue of human trafficking is deeply complex, Moody Radio's vice president, Collin Lambert, held "Human Trafficking, a Summit for Finding Our Voice" on Moody's campus in Chicago on June 6. Among the more than 40 attendees made up of law enforcement agencies, para-church ministries, local social agencies and Moody representatives, Cook County States

Attorney, Anita Alvarez, addressed the lunchtime gathering.

Alvarez provided an update for what is being done in the

Mary Frances Bowley, The White Umbrella state of Illinois related to human trafficking in the area of legislation, victim advocacy and prosecution. In addition to stressing that law enforcement cannot tackle this problem without assistance from the community, Alvarez expressed her sincere gratitude for Moody's involvement in bringing together key players to talk about solutions.

"Through this summit we were able to learn more about this issue from a select group of frontline workers—both secular and Christian—who are right now engaged in this critical battle," said Collin. He developed a burden for this issue after hearing a secular talk show discuss human trafficking with no call to action or offering a voice of hope. "I encourage

everyone to pray that Moody's various efforts would be effective in bringing the transforming power of the gospel to this local and global issue."

We have an abiding desire to become more nimble and agile with our leadership structures at Moody so we can adapt better to our rapidly changing world. With that in mind, after several months of study, we implemented some significant changes in June. Two existing teams—the President's Cabinet and the Administrative Cabinet—were replaced by one new leadership team called The President's Council.

The President's Council consists of 21 leaders from throughout the organization, seeking to equally engage people from Education, Radio, Publishing and Operations. It meets monthly with three clear objectives: 1) to review what is happening throughout Moody with a view toward bringing greater alignment in the organization; 2) to provide feedback and input to the Executive Team regarding strategic matters; and 3) to accomplish vital tactical work for Moody.

The tactical work will be accomplished not by standing committees but through the appointment of task forces. Once a key tactical issue is identified, an appropriate task force will be appointed consisting not only of members of the President's Council but also key personnel throughout Moody. A clear charge will be established for the task force and a deadline will be given to report back on their findings.

Once the task force has finished their work, it is disbanded—enabling greater agility for future projects.

For example, we have identified a need to increase the racial and gender diversity of our staff, faculty, leadership and student body at Moody. At a recent President's Council meeting, we began the process forming a task force to study the matter. We will outline the boundaries of the charge given to the group and appoint key personnel to serve on the task force. With a deadline in view, they will meet, research and bring back recommendations to either the President's Council or the Executive Team.

The strength of this structure is it does not bog down the entire leadership team with tactical work but allows a variety of issues to be handled simultaneously by different task forces, utilizing expertise across Moody. With the speed of change today in the world, we need the ability to examine many issues without overburdening our staff. We believe the structure and purpose of our new President's Council will enable us to do that

so precious," she recalls. "Things they said still stick with me, such as their challenge to use my time wisely and to dig my roots deep into the Word of God."

Lindsay began singing and writing songs while growing up with her twin sister, three older sisters and her parents in Merritt Island, Fla., but she honed her skills at Moody, where she sang in the gospel choir and led worship in chapel and Student Mission Fellowship.

Instead of music, however, she majored in applied linguistics and planned to follow in the footsteps of professor Steve Clark, who spent years overseas as a Bible translator. But during an internship with SIM Ethiopia, the missionaries stressed to her that they felt God had put a call on her life in music ministry. Even professor Clark told her to pray about it. She did, and after graduation, a door opened to become worship leader at Harvest Bible Chapel in Rolling Meadows, Ill. She toured with Casting Crowns in fall 2011 and spring 2012, and plans to tour this fall with Christian artist, Matthew West.

When she felt disappointed one day because she wasn't doing Bible translation, her manager told her, "Lindsay, you are a Bible translator—you are translating the Bible into song." Lindsay now sees God's calling on her life to effectively communicate God's Word, whether that means writing a song based on a truth in Scripture, translating the Bible overseas someday or leading a woman's Bible study at church.

Match Savings Plan with VALIC

Who is allowed to save for retirement in a 403(b) account with VALIC?

- All full-time and part-time, non-student employees may save for retirement in a 403(b) VALIC account. Upon hire, the employee must complete a form indicating they want to enroll or reject enrollment. A three-percent deduction will be taken from each paycheck unless the employee specifies a different amount. If enrollment is rejected at hire, employees can sign up at any time later by completing the "Intend to Enroll" form.
- Initially, funds are invested with the American Century Strategic Allocation Moderate Fund (60 percent stocks, 40 percent bonds). When the employee is able to access the account online at www.valic.com, investment choices may be changed.

How often may the deduction from pay be adjusted, and what is the maximum contribution?

- It is recommended that employees consider increasing once per year at salary review time, but changes may be made any month of the year. There is no limit on the number of adjustments per year.
- For investors under the age of 50, the 2012 annual maximum is \$17,000; for age 50 and above, \$22,500; at 15 or more years of service, a catch-up contribution of \$3,000 per year up to five years is permitted.

Who can take part in the VALIC 401(a) matching plan?

- Full-time and part-time, non-student employees who complete a year of employment with more than 1,000 hours of work can start the 401(a) matching plan with VALIC on January 1 or July 1 following that 1,000-hour year.
- Moody will then contribute four percent of pay to the 401(a) account, whether the employee contributes anything or not to a 403(b) account.
- If the employee contributes three percent of pay to a 403(b) account, Moody will match up to three percent, giving the employee a total of seven percent in the 401(a) account to their three percent contribution in the 403(b) account.

When does an employee become vested in the 401(a) account?

 After an employee has worked 1,000 hours or more during three separate years, they are vested in the VALIC 401(a) account.


